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Regional Land Use Partnership Ask


 The Scottish Land Commission had been asked by the Scottish Government to provide advice and make recommendations on the establishment of Regional Land Use Partnerships (RLUPs)

Scottish Government's Programme for Government 2019:

"we will make regional land use plans to maximise the potential of every part of Scotland's land to contribute to the fight against climate change"



Timeline





Current Policy and Practice Environment

- Land Rights and Responsibility Statement;
- Community Empowerment and the 'place principle';
- National Planning Framework and Regional Spatial Strategies;
- Economic Strategy;
- Scotland's Climate Targets;
- Land Use Strategy;
- Funding post Brexit.



Direction of Thinking

- The establishment of RLUPs offers a significant new opportunity to deliver a step change in the way land use decisions are made:
 - With a clear focus to drive action and delivery on the ground of targeted and prioritised outcomes at a pace and scale to meet climate and environmental targets;
 - A collaborative and innovative approach to land use planning through empowering local and regional decision making across the whole of Scotland producing Land Use Frameworks;
 - Support economic recovery and renewal.



Regional Approach

- Resolving competing demands and choices about land;
- At a regional scale opportunities, options and priorities can be identified and implications considered;
- Integration and synergies with others can be considered;
- Community empowerment Local place plans, Landscape Partnerships;
 Landscape Enterprise Networks;
- Partnerships can **empower** place-based action at a regional level across Scotland.



Potential for Regional Land Use Partnerships

- Stimulate action and delivery as well as having an advisory role;
- Connect directly to levers of funding and finance;
- Integrate with established regional economic and spatial planning;
- Are empowered to make decisions on priorities and resourcing at regional and local level;
- Are well connected to local delivery mechanisms and communities;
- Carry sufficient weight to give traction on the ground to the Land Use
 Strategy and Land Rights and Responsibilities Statement.



Purpose and Functions of RLUPs

- Engage widely on the land use opportunities, choices and priorities and drive a collaborative approach to land use decision making in the public interest;
- Develop and drive delivery of a Regional Land Use Framework, through best practice engagement;
- Prioritise and target delivery of specific public funding streams;
- Broker collaboration and delivery with local delivery partners.



Geography

- Area of tension physical geographies such as catchments vs administrative geographies;
- We recommend phased establishment of 12-15
 Partnerships based on the geography of planning authorities;
- Integration with other plans and the urban / rural land use divide, covering all of Scotland.



Governance

- Partnership appointed board of 10-12 individuals serving fixed terms;
- Board members drawn from three pools of expertise:
 - public body / government;
 - individuals with relevant sector expertise;
 - community
- Partnerships underpinned by an accountable body that would administer the function;
- National group to provide oversight and maintain collective delivery momentum in relation to national targets.



Implementation

- Recommend that Scottish Government work with early adopters to establish the first partnerships in 2021, to test approaches and inform wider implementation;
- Recommend timescale for RLUPs with Regional Land Use
 Frameworks in place for all of Scotland ahead of the next Climate
 Change Plan (2023/24).
- Integrate with established regional economic and spatial planning particularly Regional Spatial Strategies.



Supporting Work

- Stakeholder Workshops outlining emerging principles inviting comment from stakeholders to help shape the principles and thinking;
- Interim Report which set out thinking and proposals drawing on engagement and analysis to date but also identifying key issues for further consideration and comment;
- Webinar and Public Survey;
- Review of International Experience of Land Use Plans (Land Use
 Consulting in association with Collingwood Environmental. To identify and
 examine international examples of governance arrangements for regional
 scale land use planning to inform SLC recommendations.
- Lessons from Collaborative Partnerships (University of Edinburgh). Map existing initiatives in Scotland and explore their governance models and function, identifying strengths and weaknesses;
- Research Review (JHI) research analysis and providing expert opinion on the issues for consideration of the Interim Report.
